

C. E. Robinson and Associates, Golf Architects, were retained and plans were prepared and approved for the additional nine holes. General contractor for the expansion was the local firm of H. H. Latimer Construction Limited.. Some preliminary work was carried out in the late summer of 1964 during John L. Crowe's term as President but, due to rainy weather and wet grounds, work was halted early in the fall.

In June of 1965, during Foster Cox's term as President, work of building the new nine holes began in earnest. Favored with almost perfect weather conditions, the majority of the work was completed by mid-September. Only six greens remained to be seeded, bunkers filled and other work of a minor nature to be completed.

This work is expected to be completed early in 1966 and officers of the club are hopeful that at least some of the holes will be playable by late summer of that year. In any event, the expanded course will be ready for play at the opening of the 1967 season Canada's Centennial Year.

According to the architects, the course should prove to be most attractive and most difficult. Total yardage is over 6,200 yards with a feature being four water holes. Greens on the new nine have built in bunkers and some greens have two or three levels. It is expected that in 1967 the course will be recognized as a championship layout.

COST OF EXPANSION AND TOTAL INDEBTEDNESS

Facts and figures available place the total club indebtedness at approximately \$225,000 dollars when the expansion was completed. This figure includes all club debts, present bonds outstanding and also allows for an expenditure of over \$100,000. dollars for new machinery.

FINANCIAL COMMITTEE

To arrange for financing of the project, a special committee, chaired by Judge Robert F. McLellan, has been selected from among club members. Other members of the committee are: C. E. Stanfield, Bernard Sidler, Club President H. E. Power, Vice-President A. D. Nelson, A. L. Ormiston, Hartley Cunningham and Donald J. (Lick) MacDonald. Mr. Stanfield, Mr. Sidler and Mr. Nelson have been appointed to act as a pace-setting committee while Dr. Roy Davis, G. C. Ritcey, Ken Lewis and Ryland Marshall have been selected as team captains.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

It is proposed that the management of the club in the near future come under the direction of a Board of Directors and that the club will engage a full-time Secretary-Manager.

VOTING RIGHTS

It is proposed that full playing members, both male and female, shall have voting rights in the club.

TRURO GOLF CLUB HISTORY OF SHIELD

In the early 80's when Jim Crowdis was our Golf Pro, he was about to place an order for golf shirts with Fletchers and they were offering to put the logo on for free. When I was in the pro shop he told me about Fletchers offer and asked me if I could come up with something asap.

The Truro Golf Club is one of the oldest in the Province established in 1903 - I thought it was deserving of something to represent the Town of Truro. I chose the outline of the Town of Truro graphics which was used in the Truro Bicentenary.

The shield has been modified reflecting the colors of the Nova Scotia flag which are: Azure-blue-gold and red on a white back ground.

The Shield for the Truro Golf Club is as follows: The border is blue - the banners inside top and bottom are blue with gold letters and gold outlines - inside the banners are four red fleur-de-lis (our flag has eight) one on each side and one top and bottom - within the red outlines - with in the gold center a red golf ball on a tee and crossed golf clubs.
